Chapter 1 of the Wyoming Water Quality Rules contains water quality standards to protect designated uses of surface waters in Wyoming, including agriculture, fisheries, industry, drinking water, recreation, scenic value, aquatic life other than fish, wildlife and fish consumption. The proposed revisions to Wyoming's surface water quality standards in Chapter 1 advance the statutory purposes expressed in W.S. 35-11-102 and are mandated by W.S. 35-11-302(a)(i) and 33 U.S.C. 1313 of the federal Clean Water Act. Pursuant to W.S. 35-11-1104(a)(iii), these surface water quality standards do not regulate water rights or allocations administered by the State Engineer or State Board of Control. Since Article 8, Section 1 of the Wyoming Constitution declares all natural surface waters within Wyoming to be the property of the State, the Wyoming Department of Environmental Quality does not consider the proposed revisions that prescribe water quality standards to protect designated uses of the State's property to be a "private" property issue.

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
